

<u>Primary Farm Assurance (PFA)</u> is a capacity-building program designed to assess good agricultural practices (G.A.P.) in developing economies and emerging markets. Offering a stepping stone to the flagship GLOBALG.A.P. <u>Integrated Farm Assurance (IFA) standard</u>, the PFA program contains three PFA levels (Entry Level, Intermediate Level, and Advanced Level) that aim to support the gradual adoption of safer and more responsible farming practices. It has a shorter list of requirements than IFA, making the program more accessible to smallholders.

Benefits of implementation

- Farm management: Improve the efficiency of farm operations in the areas of food safety, environment, traceability, and workers' health, safety, and welfare.
- Risk mitigation: Cut exposure to food safety risks and fulfill local legislation requirements on food safety topics.
- Practical approach: Work towards full certification by moving step by step through three consecutive PFA levels at an achievable pace.
- Market entry: Gain access to local, regional, and national markets through proof of G.A.P. compliance.
- Available globally: Apply a capacity-building program designed specifically for small-scale producers and producer groups.
- Certification and verification bodies: Receive an assessment from either GLOBALG.A.P. approved certification bodies (CBs) or verification bodies (VBs).

The stepwise approach to GLOBALG.A.P. certification



Five steps to conformance

1 Download the PFA level documents

You will need the PFA general rules, the PFA principles, and the checklist. You can find the documents for free and in multiple languages in the **GLOBALG.A.P. document center**.

(2) Implement the requirements

Use the PFA principles to implement the requirements, and then conduct a self-assessment using the checklist.

Request a CB/VB assessment

Contact the CB or VB of your choice and request an assessment.

(4) Complete the CB/VB assessment

The CB/VB assessor will conduct the assessment. Any non-compliances which are detected must be corrected within the specified period and verified by the CB/VB before a letter of conformance can be issued.

(5) Receive your letter of conformance

The PFA letter of conformance is valid for one year, and you must undergo and on-site CB/VB assessment annually to retain conformance status. Your status will be publicly visible in the GLOBALG.A.P. IT systems for transparency in the market.
